Good News...*and* we know more is still needed to 'build back better'.

"The CCRG Funding has enabled us to remain open. Without this funding, we will have to raise the rates for our private paying families a substantial amount to offset the fact that we have so many vacancies and a closed classroom. Additionally, we may need to reduce our hours of operation in order to be able to keep enough staff on site without being able to combine children in classrooms."

"The CCRG Program has been a great asset to the early childhood setting and has been a major factor in [Child Care Center] being able to remain operable. It is with high hopes that the program has enough financial support to continue into the 2021 year."

"The grant is the only thing that allowed our center to re-open and stay open this past year. We've been here 25 years and would have had to close permanently without the grant."


Of the 2,001 licensed centers that were open in Feb. 2020 and received CCRG in 2020, 98% are still open. Just 1.7% permanently closed (34 programs) and 0.15% (3 programs) are temporarily closed.

Recap of the Governor's Announcement

- 3 months of CCAP eligibility for parents/guardians engaged in job search
 - Must meet all other CCAP eligibility requirements
 - Parents who obtain an eligible activity within 3 months will be eligible for the full 12 month eligibility period
 - Families can find information at illinoiscaresforkids.org or their local CCRR
- Child Care Workforce Bonuses
 - Available to all staff in programs eligible for Child Care Restoration Grants
 - Bonuses will be approximately \$1,000 per staff member
 - Employers will apply through Gateways Directors Portal
 - Rolling applications from October 2021 March 2022
- Continued Child Care Restoration Grants through December 2021
 - Awards are structured to taper (decrease) with each funding round
 - July-September 2021 = 60% of the 2020 award amount
 - October December 2021 = 40% of the 2020 award amount
- Stabilization Grants in 2022
 - More information and application are coming soon

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Our Transformation Priority is to provide <u>equitable</u> access to highquality early childhood education and care services for all children from birth to age five in Illinois.




Governor Pritzker's Goal:

Our Priority <u>Requires</u> Transformation

Our current approach to funding ECEC programs is not producing equitable access to services.

The federal landscape is changing with the potential of the American Families Plan and we have to prepare our system for transformative change directed *and funded by* Congress. We need to build a system that can equitably distribute resources, and then fund that system adequately.

Our Commitment—Our Strategies

Ensure	ECEC policy is influenced by community voice and data
Build	a structure for equitable allocation of current and anticipated ECEC funding
Redesign	our funding streams so they are stable, predictable, and consistent for providers

- 1. Create local and regional community systems
- 2. Compile and analyze racial, social, and geographic data on funding and high-quality access, providing information the state has never had for its funding policy decision-making
- 3. Use this new data to ensure equitable distribution of existing and new funding, including federal relief dollars, child care rates, early childhood block grants
- 4. Devise strategies for more timely, predictable funding for providers
- 5. Structure provider contracts to tie quality standards to funding allocation
- 6. Devise approaches to a centralized/coordinated funding allocation method for education and care services
- 7. Advise on the coordination of interagency operations and authorities as funding allocation and distribution becomes more centralized
- 8. Work with our partners to design COVID-19 supports and strategies through all the phases of the pandemic.




Map of Grant Recipients



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Federal Supports for Child Care: 2021






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Federal Funds for Child Care Relief: 2021

- Illinois received approximately \$1.6 BILLION from ARPA to invest in our Child Care Infrastructure
- CRRSA: \$331 Million in broad child care relief
- ARPA child care funds are across three buckets:
 - **\$496M** in **CCDF Discretionary funds**, targeted toward increasing and maintaining access to child care subsidies
 - **\$796M** in **Child Care Stabilization Grant** fund, which requires states to distribute funds to:
 - stabilize existing licensed and license-exempt child care programs
 - Programs must be open and available to provide services or who are temporarily closed due to COVID-19
 - The program allows states to develop applications and requirements for
 - stabilization programs
 A portion of funds can also be used for administration, supply-building, and technical assistance
 - \$19.9M in CCDF Mandatory funds


What we have Learned through CCRG



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More of What We Have Learned so Far

Preliminary results from IDHS/INCCRRA survey on future needs to stabilize child care show **supports for staff** to be the highest area of need according to program administrators from all types of licensed programs across the state



This data aligns with some of the NAEYC findings from their July 21 analysis found <u>here</u>. 76% of their respondents say they would accept a temporary compensation increase, though 32% worried about effect on public benefits.

Building on What We Have Learned: \$300 million in 2022 stabilization grants

Support stability in child care with predictable funding that can better cover workforce and other operational costs.

ELIGIBILITY	Licensed child care centers and homes serving a minimum threshold of children in the Child Care Assistance Program	
STRUCTURE	Provide 15-18 months of funds paid to programs quarterly in advance and allowed for certain purposes	
ALLOWABLE EXPENSES	 50% of funds must be spent on investments in the workforce, including: compensation increases, bonuses, professional development, benefits, recruitment and retention, mental health care, etc. Enhancements to the learning environment Tuition relief for families All other ARPA Stabilization Fund allowable uses 	



The Next Phase of COVID-19 Relief: 2022 Stabilization Funds

WAGE INCREASES, such as raises to hourly wages, salaries, or ongoing bonuses	raises to hourly reducing premiums for s, salaries, or insurance, making	SUPPORT FOR PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT, like scholarships, paid time for PD, new offerings for staff
COVID-19-specific SUPPORTS, such as time off to get booster shots or vaccines, transportation to vaccines	RECRUITING STAFF , e.g., to attract new workers and strengthen the diversity of programs	ADDING STAFF OR CONSULTANTS FOR KEY FUNCTIONS, like mental health consultants or back-end admin support

Additional ECE Investments: MIECHV

Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)

- >\$40 million distributed across all 56 grantees nationwide
- >\$1,144,428 = Illinois allocation based on formula
- ≻Timeline: May 2021 September 2023
- ≻61% of funds will go directly to MIECHV eligible providers
- Seven priority areas identified by HRSA our federal funder

Seven Federal Priority Funding Categories for MIECHV

Service delivery.

Hazard pay or other staff costs.

Home visitor training on conducting virtual visits, emergency preparedness,, improving family outcomes in MIECHV benchmark areas, & more.

- Technology to support virtual home visiting.
- Prepaid grocery cards.

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Emergency supplies, inc. diapers, infant formula, face masks, food, water, soap, hand sanitizer.

Diaper bank coordination to provide enrolled families with emergency or through reimbursement to, or purchase from, diaper banks.
