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# NEW TRAININGS



A number of new trainings have recently been added to the Gateways ilearning website. These trainings are available to all child care providers in the state, free of charge! They will help you meet requirements for DCFS licensing as well as count toward health and safety training hours. Check out courses.inccrra.org for easy access to these exciting new trainings.

Supporting Breastfeeding-friendly Environments – This training will help child care providers understand how to create chest/breastfeeding-friendly policies and environments that align with state and federal laws, Illinois licensing standards, and best practice. It was developed by the Illinois Public Health Institute with support from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention and Illinois Department of Public Health, Office of Women's Health and provides one clock hour of professional development credit.

**School-Age and Youth Development Credential Level 1** – While this series of trainings has been around for a while, it is now available completely online! Providers are now able to take all 16 modules of the SAYD Credential Level 1 online and earn their credential.

You can still find several other trainings you might need on ilearning as well, including Trauma Informed Care for Child Care Providers, Lead in Water: Protecting Illinois Children, and Asthma Management. We'll have more new trainings coming this Fall and important updates to some existing training too.

#### Birth to Five Illinois Seeks Staff & Council Members **Across the State**

Illinois has committed to building a statewide regional and community infrastructure to improve quality, equity, and access to Early Childhood Education and Care (ECEC) programs and services across the State, particularly for families who have been historically marginalized. This initiative, Birth to Five Illinois, has been established as the newest department of INCCRRA.



The Birth to Five Illinois regional staffing structure includes a Council Manager (all 39 have been hired), Family & Community Engagement Specialist (now hiring!), and Administrative Support (now hiring!) in each region of the State.

- The Regional Administrative Support staff will be responsible for providing administrative, communications, and research/data support to the regional Birth to Five Illinois department.
- The Regional Family & Community Engagement Specialist will play a vital role in establishing the foundation of support for this new effort to build a statewide early childhood infrastructure within their region.

Job postings are currently live for numerous regions. Applicants must live or have experience within the region for which they apply. Learn More & Apply Now!

## **Illinois Child Care COVID Impact Report**

The Illinois Network of Child Care Resource and Referral Agencies (INCCRRA) received support from the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) to closely examine the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the early childhood education industry in Illinois. This report explores some of the overarching effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the state's early childhood educators, parents, and the industry as a whole from March 2020 to June 30, 2021. Using a mix of quantitative and qualitative analyses, we researched changes in enrollment, funding, staffing, finances, virtual learning, and more. Among other things, we found large differences in enrollment, new changes to keep everyone safe, and high stress levels among providers and staff members.

# **Handprint Fall Trees**

## They're cute and easy to make:

- Trace the child's hand and wrist on a piece of paper. If your kids are old enough, let them do this step by themselves to build their fine motor skills.
- Ask the child to paint or color the inside of their handprint. We recommend brown as this will be the trunk of the tree, but let kids' imaginations run wild.

 Have the child cut small pieces of red, yellow and orange tissue paper into squares. If your kids are too young to handle scissors, you'll need to do this step for them.



This is a fun fall activity for preschoolers that parents will also love!











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
