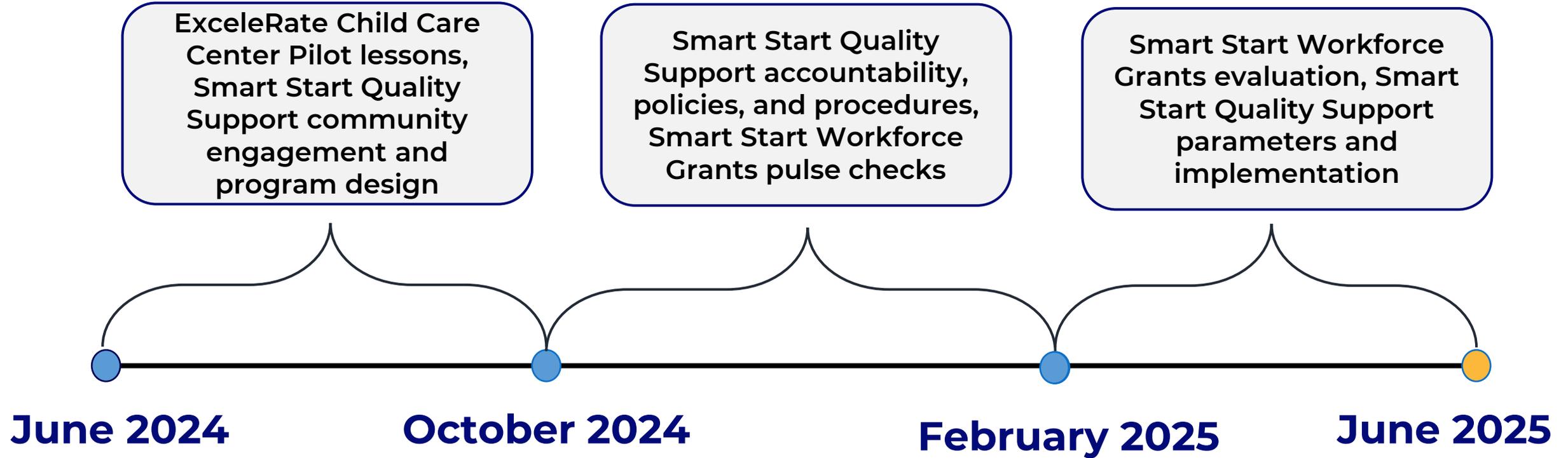

A year of planning year for Smart Start Quality Support Program expansion





Build **understanding and alignment** on strategic intent and goals



Provide **input and feedback** throughout the design process



Review and pressure-test relevant cost analyses, potential policy options, and administrative options



Surface any **potential risks and opportunities**



Support overall plan development and **champion it among stakeholder groups**

Common Themes

- Providers will need support with understanding eligibility for workforce grants and the application process.
- Providers will also need clarity on allowable uses of funds, such as whether funds can pay for staff wages outside of the funded classrooms and if funding can be used for benefits.
- IDHS should monitor Smart Start Workforce Grants implementation to understand common challenges for providers and gaps for participating programs.

Questions and Concerns

- Members asked questions about the CCAP enrollment percentage and classroom enrollment minimums.
- Members raised concern about unintended consequences for programs with layered funding.
- Members were concerned about programs who are not eligible and the potential impact on the overall cost of child care.
- Members wondered how many/which programs will be left out given the change in CCAP enrollment eligibility and the classroom funding model.

The budget for Smart Start Child Care passed the Illinois General Assembly and was signed into law as a part of the SFY 25 budget!

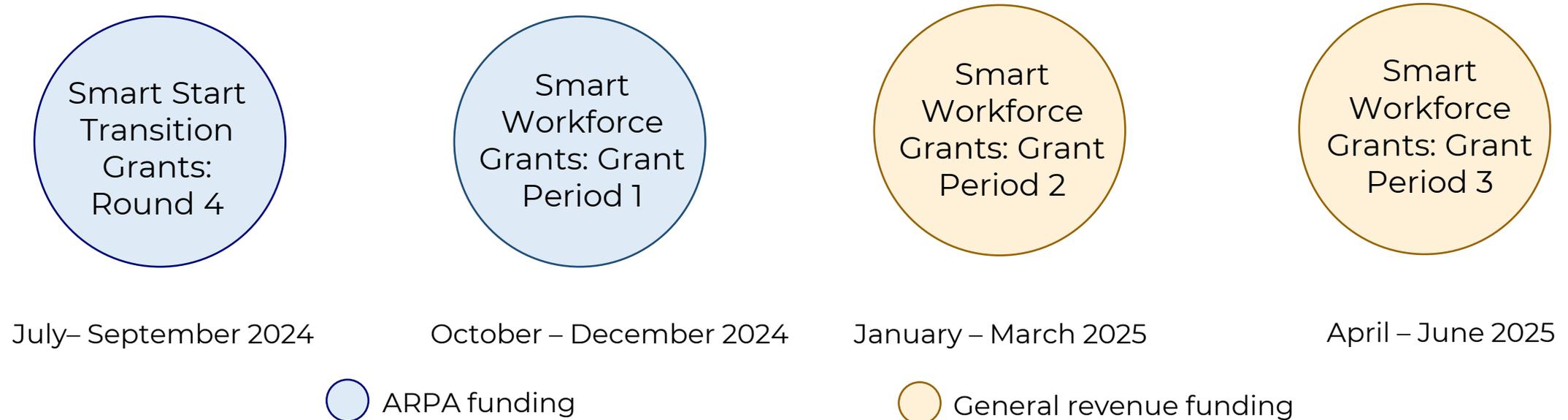


Smart Start Child Care received bipartisan support in the General Assembly and passed the Governor's proposed budget for Smart Start Workforce Grants, Smart Start Quality Support Program, and the Smart Start Apprenticeship Program.

- **\$110 M** GRF for Smart Start Workforce Grants
- **\$10 M** GRF for Smart Start Quality Support Program
- **\$2 M** GRF for Smart Start Apprentice Program

The FY25 budget funds Smart Start Workforce Grants with ARPA funding and state general revenue funding (GRF) appropriations

- **\$200M** is the annualized cost of the Smart Start Workforce Grant program in State Fiscal Year 2024 and State Fiscal Year 2025
- **ARPA funding** will cover Smart Start Transition Grants for July – September 2024 and Smart Start Workforce Grants for Grant Period 1 (October – December 2024)
- GRF funding for Smart Start Workforce Grants begins in January, so Governor Pritzker's budget proposal **represents half of the annualized cost**

Questions and discussion from Ad Hoc members informed updates, clarifications, and training for Smart Start Workforce Grants

Policy updates: waivers

- Programs that do not meet classroom enrollment minimums may apply for a **limited** or **annual waiver**.

Developed resources: Detailed FAQs

- INCCRRA released two detailed FAQ resources – one specifically for centers and one specifically for family child care and family group child care
- FAQ resources will be updated as needed

Training and technical assistance

- Local experts embedded at CCR&Rs are trained to support providers with the application process
- Additional training opportunities and resources will be available via Gateways

Programs may be awarded Smart Start Workforce Grant funds for classrooms that meet minimum enrollment criteria

	Age group	Enrollment minimum
Center-based programs	Infants/toddler classrooms	4 children
	Two-year-old classrooms (and transitional 2-3 year-old classrooms)	8 children
	3-5 year-old classrooms	12 children
	Family child care/Family group child care	4 children

Programs may request a waiver if they do not currently meet the classroom enrollment minimum requirement

Limited waiver

- Provides programs an opportunity to **raise their enrollment to meet the minimum requirements over the course of one quarter.**
- Center-based programs may be granted 1 waiver per classroom, with a maximum of 3 waivers in the first grant year. Family child care/family group child care programs may be granted 1 waiver in a grant year.
- TA provider will visit to learn more about the need for the waiver and help programs work toward meeting the requirement.

Annual Waiver

- **Allows programs who are licensed for below the classroom minimum requirement to participate** in Smart Start Workforce Grants
- Classrooms with annual waivers will receive a reduced award amount (\$3,250 quarterly for preschool classrooms in SFY 25).
- Family child care/family group child care programs with annual waivers are not eligible for assistant funding.
- DCFS licensing letter or statement from DCFS confirming capacity required for verification and waivers will be reviewed each fiscal year.

Additional detail on the timeline for grant applications was also released

Efforts to clarify concerns related to layered funders are underway

- Connected with Head Start Collaboration Office and Head Start Association and reviewed data to understand system implications of Smart Start Workforce Grants
- Reviewed Early Childhood Block Grant cost survey data to understand implications for Preschool for All/Prevention Initiative programs
- Invited layered funding programs to share potential impact of Smart Start Workforce Grants on their program

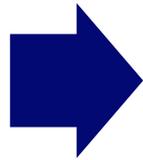

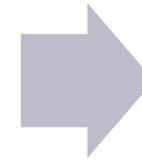
Smart Start Quality Support Program began as the **ExceleRate Child Care Center Pilot Program** in 2020

Initiated by the Governor's Office of Early Childhood Development as part of Illinois' **Preschool Development Grant Birth to Five.**



Designed to test:

- Contract funding method
- Additional supports for Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI)
- Execution of new standards



Includes:

- **34** Licensed child care centers
- CCAP Region 2
- At least **40%** of enrolled children participating in CCAP

In FY 24, the ExceleRate Child Care Center Pilot became the Smart Start Quality Support Program

The Smart Start Quality Support Program intended to:

Pay staff members wages that honor their credentials

Funds support programs to implement a wage ladder where staff earn increased compensation for credentials.

Improve staffing patterns

Participating centers may use funds to hire additional staff above minimum licensing standards

Offer activities to support continuous quality improvement

Activities include 1-1 coaching and a community of practice for directors, using tools like Environmental Rating Scales and Plan-Do-Review processes

**For Smart Start Quality Support Pilot, “teaching staff” is defined as directors, teachers and assistant teachers*

Several evaluations have found that the pilot resulted in positive outputs for staff and providers.



The number of staff at participating sites grew.



Teaching staff at participating sites earned additional credentials.



Turnover at participating sites decreased, particularly for those individuals who earned a new credential.

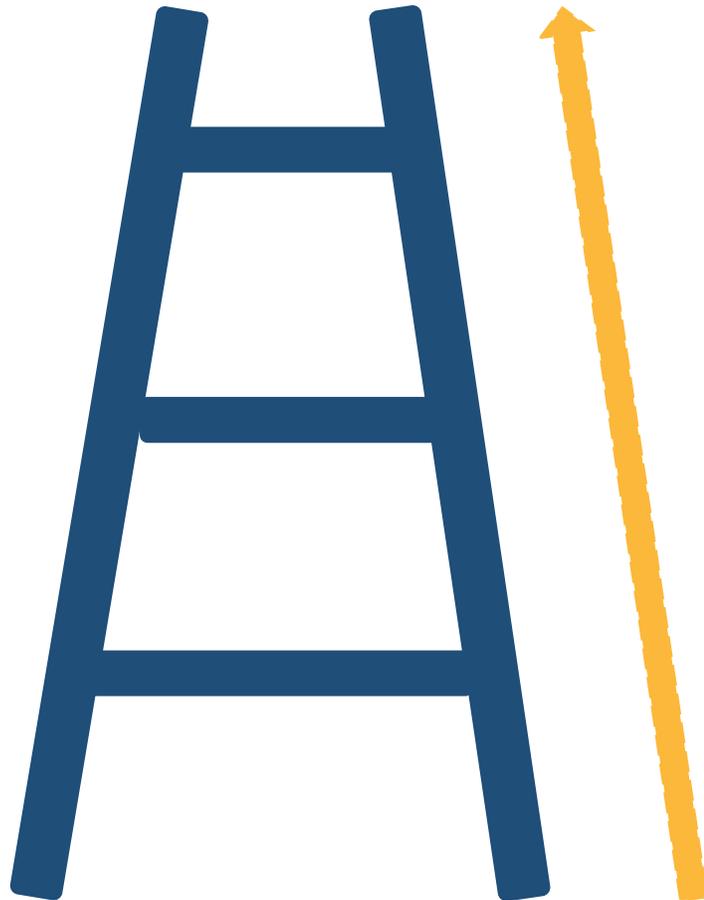


Qualitative feedback identified overall positive impacts of the program, as well as opportunities for improvement.

Our goal in SFY25 is to propose a recommendation to expand Smart Start Quality Support program in SFY26.



The Smart Start Quality Support Program can build on Smart Start Workforce Grants to progress toward quality



Smart Start Quality Support Program

Support child care programs committed to enhancing their quality

Smart Start Workforce Grants

Raise wages to promote program stability and staff recruitment and retention

Quality support program will support pathway to quality

GOAL

Support and adequately fund the pathway to higher quality **with a focus on equity**

CURRENT STATE

Quality improvement is needed statewide, but not all providers have what they need to jump into rigorous PFA/HS standards

There are not enough PFA/HS funds for all providers that would like to implement higher quality standards

INTENDED PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Child care workers with higher credentials will receive higher compensation tied to those credentials

Programs will be better positioned to successfully apply for PFA/PI funding with improved structural quality

CURRENT PROGRAM APPROACH

Provide funding for more robust staffing patterns and participation in PD/coaching

Provide funding to increase compensation for providers with higher credentials

The Smart Start Quality Support Program can help programs fund “structural quality”



Fund quality improvement through pay increases for credentials and degrees



Fund improved ratios and group sizes above licensing standards



Fund support staff (admin assistants, specialists, etc.)



Fund staff supervision and training

Key questions for us to consider during the design process

- What aspects of quality do we want to focus on in this grant?
- Who will be eligible for this program and what is needed to participate?
- How can participating programs use funding?
- How will this program interact with other funding opportunities?
- What would enable Smart Start Quality Support Program to become a pathway to other funded programs with high quality expectations (PFA/Head Start)?

Ad hoc and community engagement will help design a recommendation to expand the Smart Start Quality Support Program
