## Common Themes

- Participants were very pleased with the wealth of data shared and emphasized the positive impact that Smart Start Workforce Grants are having on the ECEC workforce.
- Ad hoc members and other attendees requested additional data to better understand the impact of Smart Start Workforce Grants, who is being served, who is not being served, and how participation and reach aligns with equity considerations and goals.
- Participants emphasized the need to share the impact of Smart Start Workforce Grants with policymakers to make the case for continued funding.

## Questions and Concerns


- Participants had questions about Smart Start Workforce Grant outreach and technical assistance, including assessing where information gaps exist.
- There was concern about the sustainability of Smart Start Workforce Grants and consequences of losing funding for the program.
- Participants asked for more information about children served by CCAP and any disparities in enrollment based on race/ethnicity, income, geography, or other demographic factors.

# Governor's FY 26 Budget Proposal

The budget will not be finalized until the Illinois General Assembly sends an appropriation (budget) bill to the Governor for approval toward the end of May.



## Governor Pritzker's Proposed budget would increase the state's investment in critical early childhood programs and services.

- **\$21.7 million** in operational funding for the Illinois Department of Early Childhood
- **\$748 million** to maintain investment in ISBE Early Childhood Block Grant funding.
- Approximately **\$200 million** investment in funding for nation-leading Early Childhood Workforce Compensation Contracts (Smart Start Workforce Grants)
  - Represents a **\$90 million increase** coming from the State General Fund
- Other Early Childhood Investments include:
  - **\$85 million** in additional investment to cover expected increased participation in the Child Care Assistance Program.
  - **\$3.3 million** to continue expansion of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library.
  - **\$10 million** to support rate enhancements for the Early Intervention service providers.

The proposal includes \$212 million for Smart Start Child Care, a \$90 million General Revenue Fund increase from FY25.

## Smart Start Workforce Grants

- \$200 million GRF (level funding, shift in funding source)

## Smart Start Quality Support

- \$10 million GRF (level funding, no change in funding source)

## Smart Start Apprenticeships

- \$2 million GRF (level funding, no change in funding source)

The Governor's proposed FY 26 budget maintains support for the child care providers and members of the workforce who have benefitted from increased wages.

- **Program parameters and eligibility remain the same** under the proposed SFY26 budget.
- Funding is **sufficient for the levels of participation seen so far** in Year 1.
- If the number of eligible applicants increases, **IDHS may need to prioritize continuity for current grantees.**
- The Smart Start Child Care Ad Hoc advisory committee, as well as the IDHS DEC staff and partners, are **continually working to evaluate the efficacy of the program.**

**Smart Start Quality Support will continue with existing participants for State Fiscal Year 2026, providing more time for planning and community engagement to inform future growth.**

We've heard that there's additional work before we're ready to implement an expansion to Smart Start Quality Supports, **particularly in planning for the inclusion of Family Child Care/Family Group Child Care Homes.**

- Existing **participants will have the opportunity to continue** participation.
- An **increase in employer contribution expectations** to \$15/hour for teaching staff will move forward as planned.
- **Planning for the future of the program will continue** to ensure readiness should additional appropriations become available.

# IDHS is launching a Family Child Care Co-Design Workgroup to plan for a quality support pilot for home-based providers.

The Workgroup will meet 6 times between May and July 2025.

- **Meeting #1:** Understand the goals of the design group
- **Meetings #2-4:** Engage in a structured brainstorming series to develop a prototype (pilot program) to test for FCC providers.
- **Meetings #5-6:** Refined the prototype and finalize recommendations

## What is “co-design”?

- The purpose of a co-design process is to **intentionally engage the intended users** (FCC/FGCC providers) **of a product** (quality support program) **throughout the design process.**

## Outreach to identify design team begins in April

- Establishing a team of 12-15 members of family child care home providers, group family child care home providers, and partner organization representatives.
- Inviting partner organizations to help disseminate an interest form and are in our initial phases of outreach.
- Our first meeting will be on May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2025 from 7-8pm CT.
- Workgroup members will receive a \$75 stipend for each session they attend.




# Smart Start Workforce Grants




After a peak in Round 2 – due to auto-renewal of all Round 1 grantees – 3,743 programs were authorized for funding in Round 3.



Spending for Smart Start Workforce Grants continues to be on target with budget projections, with \$47.04 million distributed in Round 3.



## Looking ahead to SFY26 (July 2025-June 2026)

- **Round 1 of new fiscal year:** Applications open April 1, funds will be issued in June and July 2025
- As of the most recent round, **all eligible applicants can be funded within budget**
  - FY 25 Round 3 (current round): **\$47 million** issued
- **Budget for FY26: \$200 million total**
  - Includes administrative support (application processing, accountability, T/TA, etc.)
  - Approximately \$48 million per round available for grants

IDHS is closely monitoring SSWG applications to ensure that funds are sufficient for the entire year.

We are currently in the "Green" scenario, but if applications increase in the next round, we will approach the "Yellow" scenario.

Scenario 1: Eligible applications total less than budget (~\$48 m)



No change

Scenario 2: Applications are near or equal to available budget



*Considerations may include:*

- Prioritizing continuing applicants
- Limiting waivers
- Modifying eligibility for future applicants
- Decisions informed by Guiding Principles for SSWG decisions, including equity considerations

Scenario 3: Applications are greater than 25% of total budget

## Questions from the February Smart Start Child Care Ad Hoc Advisory Committee fall into three categories:


- Additional analysis of existing data that **can be answered today**
  - *Ex. Number of children served in each setting type*
- Analysis or data that we **expect to have later** in implementation
  - *Ex. Analysis of programs not participating in SSWG and any barriers to participating*
- Analysis or data we are not sure we will have but are **exploring options**
  - *Ex. Impact to staff in non-SSWG classrooms including changes to wages, staff morale, and turnover*

## Smart Start Workforce Grants primarily reach children in center-based settings and those enrolled in CCAP.

- In Round 3, **107,800 children** have teachers receiving support for higher wages.
  - Centers: 79,830
  - Family child care: 21,669
  - Family group child care: 6,301
- **Roughly 86,600 children enrolled in CCAP** are served by providers\* receiving Smart Start Workforce Grants.




\*Data notes:

- Includes the highest number enrolled throughout the past year, including classrooms without SSWG funding.
- Does not include site administered CCAP or DCFS Foster Care Child Care Payments.

Reporting for centers participating in Round 1 demonstrates that wages now meet or exceed the wage floor across all groups for lead teachers and assistant teachers.

ECE professionals in SSWG classrooms earning wages that meet or exceed the wage floor

**Group 1A:** Cook, DeKalb, DuPage, Kane, Kendall, Lake, and McHenry counties.

**Group 1B:** Boone, Champaign, Kankakee, Madison, McLean, Monroe, Ogle, Peoria, Rock Island, Sangamon, St. Clair, Tazewell, Whiteside, Will, Winnebago, and Woodford counties.

**Group 2:** all counties not listed in Group 1A or 1B

### **Discrepancies with reported wages in the first round of reporting led to additional technical assistance efforts and supports.**

**About 5% of Round 1 grantees reported wages below the wage floor (55 centers, 102 FCC and 20 FGCC)**

#### **Common reasons for reporting wages below the wage floor:**

- Reporting issue
  - reported wages paid prior to receiving the grant
  - for FCC and FGCC, provider listed themselves as “teacher” or “assistant teachers” (wage floor applies to teachers and assistants, but there is no wage floor for provider/owners)
- Compliance issue
  - Not paying the wage floor

#### **Technical assistance**

- Grant specialists reached out to all programs reporting wages below the wage floor.
- For reporting issues, specialists have offered assistance and options to correct the issue.
- If programs did not pay the wage floor, they must provide back pay to employees not paid the correct wage and provide proof of the correction.
- Programs notified on March 21 that Round 3 checks withheld, and they will be ineligible for FY 26 funds until any issues are resolved or corrected.

## Information sessions

- 55 sessions held between June 2024 – October 2024 to introduce local experts and technical assistance resources.
- Virtual or in-person
- Sessions also offered in Spanish

**Smart Start Workforce Grant Local Experts provide 1-on-1 technical assistance and support to child care providers in their SDA.**

“As a childcare provider, my experience with **Local Expert technical assistance has been incredibly helpful.** They provided clear guidance on improving my program's quality, helped navigate grant requirements, and offered useful resources tailored to my needs. **Their support made the process much smoother and more manageable.**”

- Local Experts are dedicated staff who can help providers:
  - understand grant requirements
  - navigate CCAP
  - complete applications
  - documentation
  - submit reporting materials
- Local Experts conduct proactive outreach to support:
  - All eligible Smart Start Transition Grant recipients (prior to applications opening in Year 1)
  - Programs with “draft” or “information required” status for applications, funding request or reporting.
  - All limited waiver recipients
  - All programs with an audit finding (starting in April 2025)
- Communicate updates and important deadlines from INCCRRA, as needed

## Most grantees have received some form of technical assistance.

- **60% of Round 1 grantees indicated that they received some form of TA from their local expert.**
  - 42% attended an information session
  - 17% had an in-person or virtual consultation
  - 28% received TA via email or phone
- Between May and October 2024, Local Experts **spent over 4,336 hours** providing technical assistance to programs across the state.
  - Avg. time spent per program: 44 min
  - Month with most time spent on TA: July
- **544 providers attended information sessions**, including **120 Spanish-speaking providers**

## The majority of providers appreciated the technical assistance for Smart Start Workforce Grants.

- Based on responses from Round 1 reporting, 81% of programs said they would use local expert TA again
  - 81% centers
  - 81% FCC
  - 76% FGCC
- On a survey distributed last fall to 200 providers, **93.8% of Spanish-speaking respondents** would use Local Expert TA again

**“All questions have been answered** with clear instruction on how to do so. I am **glad there's bilingual staff to help me.**”

**Using Local Expert and provider feedback from Year 1, we are planning some changes to make application and reporting processes easier.**
